43RD ANNUAL REPORT - 1973 SEASON

Gentlemen,

Your Executive has much pleasure in reporting upon those activities of the Club during the past season not already covered in the Highlights \S Comments in the last issue of "The Galloper's Gazette".

COMPETITION RESULTS

The 1973 Season was, like 1972, one of the most successful in the Club's long history; whilst the detailed results appear later in this Report, it is with pride that we note that once more all 6 teams won their way into the Semi-Finals with 5 going to the Finals, the A Grades and the Under 19s contested their Grand Finals, and our great Under 19s took out the first ever Junior Premiership won by the Club. A great result, from every angle.

CLUB HOUSE

The extensions to the Club House were well used and enjoyed during the season, albeit we were plagued for a period with frequent burglaries until a considerable sum had to be spent on major security measures.

It is firmly believed (and this view is also well supported by the experience of two other Clubs with recently improved facilities) that a pleasantly and functionally furnished Club House builds significantly for that very valuable commodity, Club Spirit.

The Club's longer term plans for a new Club House one day are known to all, and the necessary steps in the further development of this concept are being taken with vigour.

FINANCE

The report of the Treasurer together with the accounts appear later in this Report. It is however pertinent to make the observations here that in the field of finance the Club has grown markedly in the last couple of years from a relatively small annual turn-over situation to a position where it represents,

in all, quite large business. The fact that this financial expansion nevertheless finds the Club today in a position of strength, both in terms of invested monies and particularly significant assets, is indeed a tribute to our Treasurer, those Members who work so magnificently to raise funds, and those parents (notably parents of juniors) and supporters whose cash gifts to the Club are so much appreciated.

OVERSEAS TOUR

This tremendous and successful adventure receives separate coverage in this Report. Broad planning is already receiving attention regarding the next such tour - possibly about January, 1976, to Canada and California with a game in Hawaii en route and a game or two in, say New Zealand, Tonga or Fiji on the way home?

G.P.S. TOUR TO SINGAPORE AND BANGKOK

The Club, at the commencement of the 1973 season, decided to undertake an overseas tour at the end of that season. The original Tour Committee consisted of David Clark, Doug Wright, Peter Daley and Hugh McMaster. Under the guidance of this committee contacts were made with old clubmates overseas, and a basic tour itinerary was planned. To this end we owe our thanks to Rocky Fear in Bangkok and Barry Webb in Singapore for their efforts on behalf of their old club and clubmates.

The intending tourists were then set the mammoth task of raising in excess of \$10,000 to compensate the share of the fare for which each member was liable of \$250.00 per head. The money started to come in from wine-bottling, raffles and numerous other fund raising activities, with every touring member doing his part. Tour meetings to report on the progress of fund raising activities were a familiar scene at Finsbury of a Thursday evening.

As the date of departure drew near, a Touring Committee was formed and consisted of:-

We departed from Brisbane to Sydney on the 30th September, one day earlier because of the industrial unrest among the airlines. This meant an extra day in Sydney which all of the party enjoyed. We finally departed from Sydney as scheduled on Monday, 1st October, 1973.

In Singapore, two games had been arranged, one against the President's Fifteen and the other against the Singapore Cricket Club. The first game saw us suffering from the heat and unable to adapt to the local conditions. Our opponents were mainly drawn from the New Zealand and Australian Army in Singapore and had played several matches together under these conditions.

The Singapore Cricket Club started in fine fashion going to an early lead in the first half. They threw the ball around and seemed to have the extra men running on, on a number of occasions. The second half, however, saw a revival of the tourists as they began to settle down to the local conditions. Tries were scored in this half by Rob Timperley, Bill Schulte, and our Captain, Ian Whittle, with one of these tries being converted by Gavin Clayphan and he also kicked a penalty goal. At one stage it looked as though we could take out the match, however towards full time our energy flagged and the home side ran out winners 27 to 17. We now knew what we could expect and looked forward to the rest of the tour.

Our second match against the Singapore Cricket Club saw great Rugby from the tourists. Despite the score, the tourists never failed to show their superiority over the Singapore Cricket Club. Robin Thompson and Bruce Hughes were excellent in the lineouts with Gavin Clayphan and Lindsay Godfrey the pick of the backs.

At the end of the first half the Singapore Cricket Club led 6 - 3 being two penalties to one, however, on resumption of play in the second half, a great try was scored by Geoff Young and this was converted by Gavin Clayphan. Gavin also kicked another penalty to make the final score 12 - 9.

The hospitality shown to us by the Singapore Cricket Club and Lembers of the Singapore Rugby Union will be remembered by all. A number of the members made great efforts to see that we were thoroughly entertained throughout our stay in Singapore. The functions after the match were likewise well-planned and enjoyed by all. Once again our thanks to Barry Webb and to members of the Singapore Cricket Club and the Singapore Rugby Union.

After a most enjoyable stay in Singapore, we headed for Bangkok on the 8th October. On arrival in Bangkok we were immediately taken to our hotel, The Asia, where we were met by members of the Royal Bangkok Sports Club, our hosts in Thailand.

Our first game in Bangkok was against the Bangkok Sports Club which was comprised mainly of Europeans and again who were much more accustomed to the local conditions than our touring side. This game was played on the Royal Bangkok Sports Club Rugby Oval which had grass approximately six inches long and was well waterlogged. This was not conducive to the open style of Rugby which we had been playing on tour.

The Bangkok Sports Club, having older and heavier players, used these conditions to advantage, moving the ball up and down the side of the field using their backs sparingly. The game, generally, was scrappy with our opponents rucking and tackling well. When we obtained possession of the ball, we were able to move it well in the centres, but several movements broke down due to poor handling when there was only finishing for the wingers to do. We finished the first half with the score, Nil - Nil.

On moving to the second half an excellent penalty goal was scored by the Bangkok Sports Club, which lead they maintained until minutes from the end. In desperation Jeeps began throwing the ball around from anywhere on the field. A ruck

was held on the G.P.S. line which was won beautifully by Hughe; who slipped the ball to Daley, back inside to Tom Low and Sir Gavin chiming in beautifully to take the ball at full pace. After outstripping three or four defenders, the cover defence got to him, Gavin kicked high and followed through to score by 10 yards in from the side line. A great individual effort by Gavin when attempting to kick the goal the full time hooter was sounded with G.P.S. leaving the field winners 4 points to 3.

There was a lot more to do in Bangkok than Singapore with all the boys attending the various trips which were organised for them. We saw such places as the Bridge on the River Kwai, the Australian section of the War Cemetery, the famous Rose Gardens where exhibitions were given of Thai boxing, sword fighting, various country's national dancing and elephants at work, etc. We also saw some of Thailand's famous temples, had a trip to their lovely beach resorts the day before the second game in Bangkok. This, to a certain degree, helped us to lose the next game as a number of us became sunburned. However, we were all pleased we went on the trip as the scenery was excellent as was the day enjoyed by all.

Our guide on all these tours was most helpful whilst we were touring and befriended most of the tourists and indeed took them sightseeing outside his normal working hours.

Our final game of the tour saw us playing the President of the Thailand Rugby Union's hand-picked fifteen. The side was made up entircly of Thai Nationals who were a lot younger and a lot smaller than our players. This lack of size or age was no deterrent, however, as they threw themselves into the rucks and tackles with exceptional vigour. Their unorthordox play also upset our tight forward tyle and free running backs.

An example of their erratic play was on kickoffs. They would have their whole fifteen players spread over the entire field which, when the ball was finally kicked, would have our heavy forwards running a lot more than they were used to. Their exceptional speed and safe hands won them the day, however the final score of 21 to 9 was not a fair indication of the way the play went. Our boys tackled, yet the Thais in many instances seemed to have that extra man which really stretched our defence.

The try scored by the tourists was indeed the try of the match with Gavin excelling once again splitting the **defence** and putting Mattie Creagh away to run the length of the field and score next to the posts. Gavin also added the extra points by kicking an almost impossible penalty with a heavy ball from the sideline.

Again, after the match the Royal Bangkok Sports Club threw out the red carpet and showed us once again the greatest of hospitality. The President of the Thailand Rugby Union, Khun Chaloke Komarakul, was full of praise for the style of Rugby played by Jeeps and for their good behaviour both on and off the field. He made a presentation to our Club and invited us to return to their shores at any time we may wish to come. Our President responded with a counter invitation for them to visit us in Australia.

The tour was a success in every way with the whole 27 of the tourists thoroughly enjoying their trip to the East, both in the playing of football and enjoying the hospitality given to us by our hosts.

The best player on the tour was undoubtedly Gavin Clayphan and Ian Whittle as Captain also performed admirably.

I would also like to thank our Coach Dick Roberts for bringing the boys together in such short notice and moulding four good teams which all played good, clean, fast, open Rugby.

To my Assistant Manager, Robin Thomson I am also indebted for the support he gave me in helping to organise tours, etc. whilst overseas.

To our Baggage Master, Barry Abrahams; Selector, Ron Park; President, David Lacy Jones; and to all the players, I extend my thanks for helping make G.P.S.'s inaugural tour overseas a most successful and enjoyable one.

FIRST GRADE REPORT - R. S. ROBERTS

That beefy forward (as Frank O'Rugby called him) Roy Nerichow was our best forward and was unbeaten at the front of the lineout all season by all comers. Roy played some real blinders and was unfortunate not to have been picked in the State team.

Lloydy Graham had another great year and was voted the best First Grade Back. Taking over the captaincy from Sir Edward Lloyd lifted his own game and produced some of the best football he has played for years. He is my choice for the Australian fullback position. Other players who stood out consistently were Vice Captain John Garde, who combined his usual tear-away style of rugby with a new found flair for forward leadership. Young Robbie Thomson (he looks older than he is) who played with his usual kamikazie style and ruled the roost at the middle of the lineout; Steve Lonie one of our best maulers, and runners with the ball; the back row of Whittle, Jack, Lammond and Evans matched and beat most of the other club back rows and why not? With Ian Whittle's heart and mobility, Michael Jack's line-out jumping; Mac Lammond's ferocious tackling; and "Fat Jack" Evan's experience.

The famous Mumbles McBaron, a great half-back; an auxiliary back row forward and a driving inspiration to our whole forward pack; Dugald Clark whose magic hands and boot pulled us through several games we would have otherwise lost.

Centres Peter Evans, Greg Shambrook, Trevor Jesser whose solid frontal defence negated players such as Miller and Creagh. Wingers Victor Mackay-Paine; Craig Smith and winger cum flanker Denis Cronin, all scored some magnificent tries when they were needed.

The Q.R.U. Club saw fit to award Ian Whittle and Roy Nerichow as two of the five most promising players of 1973 and all in all the whole team including reserves were a fine body of men, whose company I enjoyed, and who I hope will all turn out again next season.

Finally I would like to thank our selectors Geo Bickerstaff and Ivor Colquhoun whose advice during the season was invaluable and the most important person of all the First Grade team Manager, Ross Mortimer who did all the work behind the scenes.

SECOND GRADE REPORT - A. ROBERTS

Personally, it was a great year for myself and undoubtedly for all those who played for the twos.

The tipsters said that following the great year in 1972, 1973 would be a bad year. Well it was for injuries - but not for achievements. Franks' fourths were tipped out in the 2nd semi after 20 minutes' extra time, and the twos and threes went down in close games in the preliminary finals. The ones had a great year - the worst starters of all the teams in the competition - but what a finish.

A Kiwi expatriate points out that in Kiwiland a squad of about 22 is picked for a season, and that squad is not changed - if a player has to sit on the bench for a number of games, he just is thankful for being in the squad. This is a far cry from our set up - there were in all 20 games and only eight played in more than half those games. There is little doubt that in a long competition season it is the team that beats the stars - and it appears that some rethinking has to be done to stop the tremendous turnover in players throughout the season.

On this point, mention can be made of the best and fairest and the best forward, namely Graham Maskell and Bill Schulte. Graham played every game and Bill missed one to get married. I can not remember them missing a training run. They did not get their trophies for those efforts but a best and fairest points system kept throughout the season showed these two improving their game at every appearance from halfway through the season. Fred Allen the great All Black coach said, when he was in Brisbane this year, that hard training of great fitness makes the good player great. It appears necessary that more players have to dedicate themselves to their football - more conscientious in training, and a greater effort in their own time to develop individual skills.

Sext year looks as though it will be a big one - a premiership under 19 side coming up, a number of top players coming back from a year's lay-off, and most of this year's players remaining, so the players who want to get to the top should do their hard work in the off-season.

The twos averaged three tries a game, half of which were scored by wingers (this includes one by Farmer Brand who was parked outside the wingers.) Gavin Clayphan for the first time did not score his 100. He averaged 6 a game, but wissed 6 games.

Three players who only played a small number of games deserve special mention. Steve Lonie played seven games, scored 14 points but in just about all his appearances he was the best forward. A lot of people say Steve is less inclined to work than others may be, however I found him a great trainer and a person who gave a 100% effort every game. Personally, I hope he plays very seriously because I think representative honours are near at hand.

Jack Evans played six games and like Stave was one of the best players at every appearance. Supporters have been saying for years that he is one of the best players in the club - let's hope there won't be any Mt. Isa next year, and the figure stays as cute as it is.

Craig Smith. Craig's fan club probably did not enlarge greatly this year because of an apparent casual attitude to his game. However, that is Craig's right. If you hold such an opinion, you should appreciate that he has just about completed his law exams in record time. He played 5 games for 8 tries. In my opinion, the first thing a winger has to do is to finish off moves and score tries. Craig does just that - he can put the ball down over the line and that's the name of the game. He's got ability to burn and if he dedicates himself he could also play representative football.

In conclusion a word for Mike Thiess. He had a big season - a lot of A Grade - on as a reserve consistently - and a great year as captain of the seconds. He largely deserves the credit for the success the twos did have. He was conscious of how the team worked as a team on and off the field.

I present for your consideration, and if thought fit, adoption at the Annual General Meeting, the Club's audited Statement of Receipts and Payments for the year ended 31st October, 1973.
