Gentlemen,

Your Executive has much pleasure in reporting upon those activities and highlights of the Club during the season recently concluded.

COMPETITION RESULTS

Coached by ex-Queensland and University front rower, Leo Williams, and assisted by Roger Herring - this team showed real dedication and character and it is hoped they will come through to the U15 grade next season.

Players, Coaches, Managers and Administrators of our club must review their attitudes when responding to those players who do not display an acceptable commitment to training, level of involvement and personal performance on the field of play.

The 'A' Grade started the season badly. We seemed to be proud of our 'late starter' tag. We lost to Easts in the first game and were soundly beaten by Souths at Ballymore. We concentrated on raising the level of fitness of all players during the two week period prior to the College game. We defeated Colleges and were narrowly beaten the following week by Uni in a very good game at St. Lucia.

Then followed a run of five consecutive wins including a thrilling 12-11 win against Brothers at Ballymore. For sheer will to win and do-or-die commitment that was probably our best performance all season.

During the remainder of the season we had many opportunities to win vital points but were unable to sustain the effort. I believe the major contributing factor was lack of fitness.

As in 1981, the 1982 season ended abruptly. We lost a game - the final fixture against Wests - a game we were capable of winning comfortably!! We were therefore doomed to a long off-season.

It was a great disappointment to them both when, despite their best efforts, we were unable to field four teams against Brothers at Ashgrove.

Last, but not least, thank you to the Reserve Grade coach for his co-operation and 'words of wisdom' during the season. Such 'words of wisdom' were forthcoming in his capacity as both coach and part-time 'A' Grade secondrow forward.

In conclusion, thank you for a most pleasant and rewarding introduction to a very fine rugby football club and to 'A' Grade coaching. With a proper attribute by administrators, coaches, players and supporters - 'you' are included - we can look forward to an exciting and successful season for the G.P.S. Club in 1983 and beyond.

RESERVE GRADE REPORT Coach: R.J. Thomson

The 1982 Season began inauspiciously for Reserve Grade with rather ignominious defeats at the hands of Easts and then Souths. Our fourth game of the Season produced a superlative effort against University. This was a hard fought game in the early season heat where we finally turned out victors thanks to some excellent individual efforts but mainly from a team will to win and realization that we could work together. So much for suggestions, and from some people who should have known better, that the Club field only 3 teams for the Season.

Active recruitment and Club management to maintain and increase players numbers is certainly preferable to withdrawing from various levels of senior Club competition. We will not encourage players by lessening their opportunity to play.

Whilst we sustained some heavy losses during the season a team rapport was achieved and in many instances teams who expected an easy victory were denied same.

Being the Reserve Grade Team, we naturally and understandably suffered attrition through replacing injured and absent A Grade Players.

The usual mid season slip off in training occurred and I believe any future Coach must give serious thoughts to what steps can be taken to alleviate the pressure caused by the paucity of trainers and players for whatever reason at this time of the season. Consideration should also be given to supporting the genuine players who for many reasons may find it difficult to play or train fully for the whole of the long season. By this I do not mean pandering to the primadonnas who consider it their right to be selected in particular teams and when not selected tend to disappear from the scene unless, and until, they see the chance of being picked in a semi-final team.

Insofar as selections are concerned differences of opinion are of course a perennial and ongoing problem. However as long as all the parties concerned realise that a certain flexibility and understanding is required rather than a dogmatic approach selections will be somewhat more amicably achieved. Of course, players notifying the selectors of their availability of otherwise still remains possibly the greatest selection problem. Those players in Reserve Grade who attend training regularly (that is to say at least one a week) will realise the importance of training together as a team. It is obvious to all an understanding between players, forwards or backs, is essential to boost their chances of winning the ball and using it to go forward and thus score points. Simply turning up for a run on the day is not satisfactory.

The Reserve Grade record for 1982 is obviously much better than it has been for a number of years. The number of younger players who demonstrated an increasing maturity in their football and extension of their talents was most encouraging. In this of course I include amongst others Michael Burrows, Don Reed, David Hay, Brett Green and Chris Paul.

The team must also acknowledge with thanks the captaincy of Don McGregor, timely arrival of Tony Rapson and outstanding management of Alan Carew.

Finished 5th and making the semi final was a reasonable result. Lets hope the team together with new players coming up from under 19 under their coach for 1983 will give him support both at training and playing so that 1983 Reserve Grade may be a serious premiership contender.

THIRD GRADE REPORT

Third grade had a mixed year, reaching some creditable heights but suffering an incrediable 88-0 defeat in one match.

However the side finished 6th on the table only 6 points out of the five and we were still in the semis hunt with two games to go.

We lost five games by less than four points and drew one match when we missed three kicks from around the goal posts. But that can not be offered as any excuse. There is an old saying that a good team wins matches by a few points and doesn't lose by narrow margins.

The side was continually hacked around by changes and there was rarely anything like a full team at practise. UNDER 14 REPORT

I am very grateful to be given the opportunity by your committee to give a brief summary of the past history of this very junior team of the GPS Old Boys Club. ASHGROVE JUNIORS R.U.C.

In the 1982 season, Ashgrove Club fielded two under 7 teams, three under 8, two under 9 and one under 11 team.

The season was one of the most successful so far as on field activities are concerned with the under 7A winning the Grand Final against Ascot-Clayfield 18/Nil, the under 8A losing in the Grand Final 12/10, to Ascot-Clayfield, and the 9A winning their Grand Final against Nudgee Junior 11/Nil. The 9B team lost in their semi-final to Toowong.

It will be noted that we did not field an Under 10 team. We have great difficulty with under 10 upwards because of the loss of prospective players from our Club to the Marist Brothers College at Ashgrove.

Our under 11 team has a solid core of about seven top little players but they regularly take the field with 11 or 12 against full 15 teams which makes the job very difficult to say the least.

The Club was not so successful administratively with fewer than usual parents involved in fund raising activities such as canteen assistance and raffles. The result is the club is low on funds and next season's registration fee will increase substantially to \$15.00. This fee has been low in past years because it has not been necessary to provide funds for the upkeep and maintenance of a playing field. Ashgrove Club acknowledges the assistance of G.P.S. Club in this respect.

The Ashgrove Club for the 1982 season became the winter tenant of Wittonga Park at Hilder Road, The Gap and as in this last season, it is hoped to have one or more teams with the Park as their home field playing under the team name of "The Gap" (these teams are in fact part of Ashgrove Club.) It is not envisaged that any development of facilities will take place at this park by Ashgrove Club as it will occupy the park as winter tenant only.

The response by potential players to the Club's recruiting efforts remains generally low. It appears that a greater effort in promoting the game is required at a high level. The promotion is clearly beyond the capacity of any junior club because of the problems peculiar to the area, but it is suggested that G.P.S. Club could assist by pressing the matter at every available opportunity with the Q.R.U.

TREASURER'S REPORT

I present for your consideration and adoption the Club's Audited Balance Sheets and Statements of Income and Expenditure for the year ended 31 October, 1982.

The Club's finances have improved dramatically due to the dedication and efforts of the members of the Ladies Committee, Lynn Jones, Ian Whittle, Lloyd Graham, and members of the various committees, who have enabled the Club to report a record surplus for the year of \$9,980. This surplus was made on a turnover slightly in excess of \$60,000.

All sections of the Club's finances have shown a healthy improvement, with the exception of Doubles and Trifecta (down \$3,318) and Homegames and raffles (down \$1,508). It should be possible to increase the profit in there areas, without affecting the other profitable section of the Club. This can only be done if the responsibility is delegated to members who are not already involved in other fund raising activities.

In the 1981 Report I mentioned that improvements could be made in the areas of Functions and Clothing. This has been achieved with combined profits increasing by \$2,350. The most dramatic areas of profit improvements have been in Bar trading (up \$4,652), Ladies Committee (up \$2,403) and Hotel Raffles (up \$2,283). These profit levels should be maintained with the continued support of all club members and supporters.

The Club has met all financial commitments for the year that have been made known to the Committee. I trust that the 1983 financial year will be as successful.

NOTES TO ACCOUNTS:

- 1. The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention and are not adjusted to take account of the current costs of specific assets and the effect of those costs on the income and expenditure for the year.
- It is practically impossible for the Club to establish full commercial controls over most types of income prior to the initial entries in the accounting records. The systems established by the committee ensure that all material items of income are brought to account.
- The bank reconciliation discloses four unpresented cheques, totalling \$10,286.80, drawn in favour of Valley District Cricket Club in March and September 1981 and 1982. The figures of cash at bank \$286 and Loan - Valley District Cricket Club \$27,105 have taken these cheques into consideration as being paid.
- 4. The Profit on bar trading represented 27% on bar trading turnover of \$29,556.
- 5. The profit of hotel raffles represented 52% on a turnover of \$9,059.
- 6. Profit on functions for the year were represented by:

The accounts of the 50th Anniversary Dinner Committee have not been finalised. An estimate of outstanding liabilities has been made in these accounts.

- 7. A write-off of \$400 of debtors considered uncollectable from the 1981 trifecta has reduced the 1982 profit to \$152.
- 8. The profit by the Ladies Committee of \$3,531 includes the profits on the 50th Anniversary Ball and food booths at home games.
- 9. The Ashgrove Joint Committee, comprising the Club and Valley District Cricket Club, has not functioned for several months. Both Clubs have incurred costs, such as repairs, insurance, cleaning, electricity etc., which have not been repaid from the Ashgrove Joint Committee funds and for which contributions have not been requested. A potential liability exists which has not been taken into account in the statement of Income and Expenditure.
- 10. Club supporters during the year made outright donations of \$335 and donations for trophies of \$870 to defray club overheads.
- 11. The balance sheet does not include several of the Club's assets, including a weight machine, goal posts and the G.P.S. Junior Fund Raising Account.
