#### **President's Report**

Financial Members, Players, Supporters, Ladies & Gentlemen, It is with pleasure I submit for your consideration the 1998 Annual Report of the GPS Old Boys' Rugby Union Club.

#### 1998 On the Field

Last year your Committee implemented a more pro-active and structured recruitment program. Those who took note will realise all grades as a result had greater player numbers. Fourth Grade, the lowest regular open grade, for all the season had problems of trying to give sometimes up to 10 or 11 reserves a run on match days. The better numbers at the start of the season were maintained throughout the season, despite of injury attrition, due to greater coaching involvement and regular coaches/managers meetings chaired by Vice-President, Paul McGahan. The result of more off-season planning and effort and on-season communication was seen in greatly improved spirit amongst players and generally better results. In regard to the spirit, hopefully we are emerging from our Calvinist period and a little more of the old Cavalier will be seen.

The ladies coached by Phil Langley made the semis for the first time. Fourth Grade coached by Mark Harris and Luigi DiClemente also made the semis. Whilst Third Grade under Chris Wake were unlucky to miss out. Fifths under player/coach Pat Manahan and Colts III with Joey Anderson won their respective Grand Finals. A great effort. However, it would have been nice to some Fifth Graders at the annual dinner. Colts I were minor premiers in a tough competition and runners up to Wests in the Grand Final.

Congratulations of course to Souths, proving their continued durability and winning the Senior Grand Final.

One swallow does not a summer make. It is easy to criticise First and Second Grade for unsatisfactory results. Lower Grades can be built fairly quickly with numbers and enthusiastic coaches. Higher Grades will not succeed on love, enthusiasm and numbers alone. Quality in team work, players, coaches

and support is necessary and only comes with dedication and time.

It took five years to build the 1996 Premiership team and one off-season to blow that structure away. The average age of this year's A Grade team was only 20. It will take time, perseverance and effort. We have talent, we are rebuilding. Witness of course the excellent Colts to come through. We are not neglecting our recruitment of both players, coaches and coaching staff. 1999 will see some changes in coaching. Paul McGahan and Rod Torkington have worked indefatigably to put in place the best possible coaching structure for the coming season. Those coaches and others have in turn been busy recruiting and retaining players. And this against a background of considerable financial inducements being offered elsewhere, particularly by Clubs supported by poker machine revenue.

Some of the coaching changes have been fraught with a considerable degree of angst. The Selection Committee has not made its recommendations lightly and whilst we commiserate with those who are disappointed, the Committee supports the process and will stand or fall on the results. Supporters should realise the difficulty of this task and give their support albeit questioningly from time to time to the process. Don't criticise in ignorance but find out the proper facts from your Committee and then form an advised opinion.

Congratulations to our representative players, Daniel Herbert, Ben Tune for whom we all wish a speedy recovery and Matt Cockbain at Australian Level. Mark Murray, Brent Cockbain (at last) and Christiaan Knapp with Queensland Reds and Cameron Northcott on his Australian Under 19 selection and Tim Heenan, Andrew Farley, Curtis Mohr and Donovan Slade on their Queensland Under 19 selection. Well done also to Joel Boogers for his belated but deserved inclusion in the Reds Rugby Academy.

Once again John Moss has represented Australia at Sevens Level and was, we believe, unjustly overlooked in the final cut

for the Commonwealth Games Team. No one has worked as hard and long as John but we know he will bounce back.

Thanks to club selector George Bickerstaff who I believe knows more about more players than any of the coaches. I believe George may be joined by another selector in 1999. There are many arguments regarding team selection processes. However, I believe having two independent selectors is most beneficial when selecting for and from 5 or 6 teams.

#### **Acknowledgements**

So much to do and so few people to do it.

Not really - there is a stack of people out there but coercion is not the way to good administrators and workers. Willingness is the major attitude and attribute. A willingness to work and learn and be part of a team. Don't come onto a committee simply to pontificate and lay down the law. Roll up your sleeves, get fully involved and you will find it a most rewarding experience. Some of this year's committee for a variety of reasons should not have stood for the committee as, after only a couple of meetings, it became clear other interests and commitments rendered it impossible for them to continue to be involved in the running of the Club. They could have been replaced with chair warmers but again that is not satisfactory.

Thanks to others, however, who did keep the Club wheels turning. Pat Reid, Secretary and Subs Harridan. Once again, without Pat and Margaret Taylor we would have had a considerable number of non-financial members. Incidentally, if you look at your

Constitution, you cannot play, be on the committee (in fact be eligible to be elected) or vote in any Club matters if you are not a financial member.

Alan Taylor was his usual cantankerous or is it recalcitrant self. Without Alan,a myriad small tasks would not get done and Rod Torkington's job would be made so much harder by not having Alan go out of his way to do so many of the tasks which get heaped on Rod but are not his responsibility.

Alby also heads a sub committee to promote a joint licensed facility for the Senior and Junior Clubs in our own catchment area. Subject to clarification of current legislation and suitable agreement with a landlord, this project will be successful, will raise our profile as a leading member of the local community and also consolidate our financial security.

Michael Thies promoted our merchandising range. Anthony Ott ran fundraising raffles and the popular Tatts Breakfasts. Paul McGahan looked largely after the playing side of the Club and Junior Club liaison including the growing Albany Creek Junior Club.

Our outgoing Treasurer, Will Colwell, welcomed an addition to his and Cathy's family, young James, this year and also undertook in his real life a considerable extra workload. Unfortunately this curtailed his undoubted effectiveness as Treasurer. If we want quality treasurers like Will, we must provide adequate accounts bookkeeping backup. An effective Treasurer is not a bean counter, but a planner and a developer for growth and financial security. Gone are the days when financial reports could be scribbled on the back of an envelope. Proper sets of accounts and analysis are needed for every meeting. Only a committee properly financially informed can make knowledgeable decisions.

In 1990 our income was about \$30,000.00. In 1996 it was \$275,000.00 and last year \$245,000.00. The business has grown and if we don't become economically literate with it, we will continue to make a loss as we did this year.

The Treasurer will undoubtedly explain the reasons for that loss. Remedial steps must be taken. We have cut expenditure. This is not the answer. Demands will increase, not decrease. More funding must be achieved. You can help in this regard. If the Club contacts you for a sponsorship or sponsorship referral, don't duck for cover. At a certain time in your life this Club — your Club — has provided you with friends, exercise, character, a feed, a beer, a girlfriend, possibly even a roof over your head. Subsequent generations are just the same. Your assistance will not go astray. Even though I am standing down as President this year, it is my attention, with the agreement of the incoming Committee, to be involved in certain funding aspects of the Club. Freed from the rigours of the day to day running of the Club, I will have the time and look forward to contacting you in this regard.

Rod Torkington has been our General Manager for two years. If he doesn't know how to do it now, he never will. His main job is fund raising with certain ancillary liaison tasks with Juniors and Valleys. He is also responsible for home games and only because of logistics making sure the bar is stocked. He is not the gear steward, groundsman, barman or general dogsbody. His office is not a dumping ground for lost property or lost souls or a place for a general chat or selection meetings. If Rod is to perform satisfactorily, which is not happening at the moment, he cannot be expected to carry out those extra tasks. These tasks belong to committee, coaches, managers, and players or other paid staff. Rod and the Committee and all others must realise the parameters and get on effectively with their respective tasks. A clear delineation and understanding of responsibility must be achieved and re-enforced if this position is to succeed. Otherwise, it is a waste of time and a time waster. Fundraising events this year were lacklustre. The golf day whilst fun for the participants, thanks to Anthony Herbert and his organisation, was financially less than could have been hoped for. The King of the Mountain was without a sponsor however should not, in my opinion, have been cancelled. It is an annual event revived by Frank Jensen successfully and can be run on a shoe string and still make a positive return. We tried bingo at home but even with Alby's effort this provided

We tried bingo at home but even with Alby's effort this provided a negative return. The black tie dinner was once again a luncheon done jointly with Wests. Laurie Mains was the guest speaker at no charge for which we thank him. Thanks also to Graham Maskell for being in primary school with Laurie. The financial results were positive but lacklustre. Wests had difficulty in providing numbers. Next year this function must reestablish its credentials.

The Fest with gridiron was, with plenty of input from Paul Reid (old fart retired), a much better success than the previous several years, showing a most positive financial result.

#### Ashgrove-GPS, Albany Creek-GPS Juniors

With the expected election of Paul McGahan to the position of GPS Club President for 1999, the close relationship between the Junior Clubs and Senior Clubs should be consolidated. Paul is a former QJRU President, a past president and Life Member of the Ashgrove GPS Junior Club, and also has been, along with Rod Torkington and Paul Reid, the main Senior Club person working with Albany Creek people to establish and maintain the Albany Creek Club. It is in no small way due to the efforts of Paul McGahan that Ashgrove is the pre-eminent Junior Club in Brisbane today and we expect in time Albany Creek GPS Juniors will achieve a similar prominence in its area of influence.

#### Valleys District Cricket Club

Congratulations to Valleys for a successful 98/99 season and their centenary. It is pleasing to see they are progressing satisfactorily at this stage of the current season. We have a good working relationship with Valleys, largely due on our part to the efforts of our General Manager, Rod Torkington. We have shared the grounds and premises with Valleys for 21 years and it behoves the incoming committee to maintain the regular dialogue which Rod has established.

#### Sponsorship

It is indeed unfortunate that Maxims no longer exists as a corporate entity. Therefore we will not have Maxims for our major sponsor in 1999 and unfortunately due to the winding up of the company not all sponsorship was received for 1998. Our thanks however to Chrysler and Garry Banks in particular who had the vision and business nouse to see that sponsoring Jeeps whilst good for us was certainly good in financial terms for the sponsor. Peter Quinn, the younger, has returned from his American sojourn and is pleased to note we have kept The Gap Tavern trading successfully in his absence. The Tavern will we trust be on board in 1999 and continue its greatly appreciated long term sponsorship. Fourex and the Bank of Queensland continue their sponsorship and we were fortunate to have Fourex Managing Director, Barry McAllister and Bank of Queensland Managing Director, John Dawson, as speakers at our breakfasts during the year. Don Macgregor, Blair Barnhill and the Naturform organisation, continue in their sponsorship assistance. The Best and Fairest Sponsorship still has not fired this year and in my opinion, needs restructuring and a revamp.

In this regard, I have had lengthy discussions with Rod Torkington, leading to an altered format about which Rod and I will be contacting members and prospective sponsors in the near future.

#### Medical

Geoff, the pain barrier, Clark, continued as our physio. Phil Manfield took a well earned rest from being Club Doctor, but being into pain and suffering, has taken up junior refereeing. Club Doctor this year was Pauline Smith, a much prettier face than Phil's and to whom we are greatly thankful for her unstinting efforts during the year. Congratulations and best wishes to our Doctor on her marriage during the year.

#### Queensland Rugby Union

The beginning of the season saw a change of Chairman with the Queensland Rugby Union. George Pippos replacing, John Breen. There are also new faces on the QRU Board in Ben Keogh and David Crombie.

The advent of Pippos led to a more pro-active board. Amongst other things, George set up a licensed Club Sub-committee to investigate how the Senior Clubs and Country Unions could achieve financial independence through the medium of licensed clubs. Contacts were established with financial institutions and licensed gaming machine operators. Discussions have been held with these people by various clubs, your own in particular. The QRU now recognises that if they do not have financially independent senior clubs, they will end up with a grossly lopsided competition.

Sunnybank are successfully running a licensed club. Barbarians are strongly supported by Queensland's largest licensed club, Kedron Wavell. On the face of it, these clubs have no financial problems as far as their rugby is concerned. They are in a position to offer inducements to players, coaches and support staff. Sunnybank seem to be of the opinion that they owe nobody a living. If it suits them to play in the Brisbane Competition so be it. If it suits them to play in another form of competition, national in nature or otherwise then they may certainly do so irrespective of the Brisbane competition or what the QRU thinks.

Certain elements backing Barbarians are not, we understand, averse to these views.

If all the clubs cannot achieve financial independence there is every possibility of a scenario arising where we have only two major clubs in Brisbane and the rest of the clubs become feeders to the wealthy clubs.

This takes into account the egos of the big picture empire builders and a small number of the best players but does not cater for the vast majority of players. Such an evolution would strongly mitigate against the future of rugby while undermining the very foundations upon which the game has been built.

The QRU has come under considerable criticism regarding the displacement of ARU Chairman, Dick McGruther. There is no doubt under McGruther and O'Neill the ARU has had its best financial year and in winning the Bledisloe Cup in a clean sweep, one of its best playing years. The problem however, is that the ARU appears to be of the opinion that all Rugby in Australia should be run from its offices and by its officers. In short its the argument which has bedevilled Australia since Federation; centralism versus states rights. Dick, an excellent and competent administrator, believes in the centralist approach whilst the QRU and other state unions believe in the individual rights. Philosophically it appears one side equates centralism with dictatorship and the other equates diversity with anarchy.

The great pity is that all parties do not work together as a constructive partnership for the betterment of Australian Rugby. Remembering of course, you will not have a strong Wallaby team if you do not maintain and build at grass roots level.

#### **GPS Constitution**

The GPS Constitution consists of the rules as set out under the Incorporations Act as it relates to Associations. Attached to this Constitution is a set of rules which in fact simply meant tacking on the old constitution of the club which was drawn up before we went to Ashgrove. This year your Committee has proposed some alterations to the Constitution, probably the most important of which is giving the financial playing members of the

Club the ability should they so wish to nominate and elect from their numbers two players to be on the Club Committee. Players have been represented on the committee for many years, but not specifically as player representatives. Club Committees are something of an autocracy rather than a democracy. Nevertheless, it is now up to players to be proactive and have two of their number on the committee: certainly to represent the players' interests, but also on behalf of the players to represent the club's interests.

I am standing down this year after some nine years as President and I note, this has not occurred without some discussion at committee level and I understand elsewhere. Midway during the year a good replacement having come onto the committee in the form of Paul McGahan, I had intended to stand down and devote myself to fishing, having been told I would never make a golfer. However, a major project assumed viable proportions during the year and will undoubtedly continue into 1999. This project concerns the building of a licensed club facility at the Albany Creek Sports Ground. I felt it was necessary to continue as President until this project had been finalised one way or the other.

Alan Taylor has as a firm article of faith a belief that Presidents should not stand for longer than three years. At the end of that time it is time for them to move over and to give someone else a go. Alby espoused this view with considerable vehemence during the year. I always appreciated Alan's forthright views and have benefited from them on many occasions. On other occasions I have disagreed and taken a different course. Fortunately both Alby and I agree on everyone's right to have a view and to debate that view robustly.

My view is that if an administrator is doing a good job then he can stand as often as he likes although recognising that all of us have use by dates, and also recognising when a replacement of ability comes along, the position should be reconsidered.

One other matter to be considered in an administrator's longevity is that after a number of years in the job any worthwhile administrator gradually finds out how the system works. Having learnt after two or three years how it works it is a bit ridiculous to then stand down and hand over to a novice and start the process all over again. When Clubs were amateur and had a \$30,000.00 per year gross turnover, experience was a bonus but not all that necessary. These days the President is the head of a many faceted business which as I have previously said is only going to get bigger. The President needs ability, business knowledge, administrative knowledge and as much experience as possible as do Committee members and all other administrators.

Having said all of that, nine years is a bloody long time during which Rugby itself has grown even more than our budget. We are still in a time of great change and upheaval and must carefully maintain out position and be prepared to chart our course into the unknown future. We have a great Club; it is up to all of us to keep it that way, a Club that produces Wallabies, Reds, Premiership winning teams and people who just like to play Rugby. To endeavour to do anything less would be a betrayal of what the Club has stood for for over 100 years. Best wishes to you all for 1999 and the new millennium and sincere thanks to all those from 1990 to now who have been instrumental and assisted in enabling our club to promote and foster Rugby excellence and assist its members along the broader pathway of life.

#### First Grade Report
